OUR SUMMER CRUISE 2021 Chapter 2

Day 3: Saturday 3rd July 2021, High Water Larne 0628 hrs. I woke early to another fine morning in Ardminish Bay and my usual routine of reviewing the weather and passage plan, boat checks, starting the engine and emptying the bilges was becoming a regular thing. All of the other boats seemed unaware of Serenity's movements as they remained silently asleep and appeared to be using Gigha as a staging post before catching the tide south later in the day. I

almost imagined hearing the mystical tones of The Lonesome Boatman whistling in my ears as I slipped our lines from the pontoon at 0545 hrs.

My plan was to head north navigating the Sound of Jura, this allowed a choice of destinations and alternate ports such as Craighouse on the isle of Jura to our west or Tayvallich near the head of Loch Sween. I had never been to either before and both would have meant tying to a mooring, my other options were Crinan or Ardfern but my aim was Craobh Marina. We were making good progress picking up 2 knots of tide halfway through our passage when Joshua appeared and took the helm. It seemed a fairly straight bearing without much deviation in our direction and calm sea, so I retreated to the galley to make breakfast, a couple of bacon baps and a much needed mug of coffee for us both, simple but hearty if not very healthy. Not long after we experienced some unintended twists and turns as we passed west of the Dorus Mor, a tidal race south of Loch Craignish, the wonders of nature forcing it's influence on Serenity's long keel with the tide moving in different directions beneath us.



I had phoned ahead to Craobh Marina when it became clear that it would be our final destination and they duly informed me of available berths. We arrived early at 11am, a speedy passage of just over 5 hours, and after securing Serenity alongside made our way to the Marina office. Though having been here before I had wondered was there a road over the hill to Ardfern, "about an hour's walk" the friendly lady in the office informed me. We made our way back to Serenity for lunch after a stroll around the pontoons and then off we set on our bicycles over the hill to Ardfern. The tarmac road soon turned into a stony lane up the hill then down again and back to a



tarmac road, quite rough in places. The nice lady in the Marina office must be a marathon walker as it took us nearly an hour on the bikes, Joshua could probably have done it much faster but I wanted to stop occasionally to enjoy the view (and get my breath back). We enjoyed some refreshments in the Galley of Lorne and returned to Craobh the way we came. Arriving back on Serenity my thoughts turned to home and the Boat Club Regatta, I duly adorned my Artemis emblazoned crew kit and toasted all those sailing fair winds and competitive racing. Dinner was in the Lord of the Isles and early to bed though it would be a later start the next day, I was tired after all that day's exercise.



Day 4: Sunday 4th July (my birthday, also celebrated in America!), High Water Oban 1445 hrs. I had previously been using tide times for Larne (high water 0731 hrs) but being closer to Oban it made sense to change, making my calculations much simpler. I had planned a later start if the weather was good and though we had a choice of destination my preference was Puilladobhran, pronounced Puldoran and means Pool of the Otters. A popular anchorage, long and narrow with good holding in thick mud, off the Isle of Seil which is notable for its "Bridge over the Atlantic". I got chatting to my neighbours in Craobh Marina who mentioned they were also for the anchorage as the weather was good and they planned to leave at 0930. This got me thinking had I got my calculations correct as I intended to leave at 1230?! On further conversation I discovered they planned to take the more cautious route and long

way round via the Sound of Luing. My planned route was taking us the much shorter passage via the narrow channels of the Cuan Sound and Easdale, quite tight in places but would take us half the time. We enjoyed our first relaxing morning secured to the pontoon after our neighbours had left and met up with them again as we exited the passage of Easdale an hour from we departed Craobh Marina, proving I'd got my calculations correct!

Our welcome was not what I had hoped for when we arrived in Puilladobhran as the dark clouds appeared and it started to rain just as we were on deck readying the anchor for deployment, a drill practised many times on Larne's Trent Class Lifeboat in my time as crew. I returned to the wheelhouse to manoeuvre Serenity astern and Joshua joined me in the shelter for a coffee after I was happy we were secure. Once the rain had passed we lowered the inflatable dinghy and off Joshua went exploring the many inlets and islets which surrounded us, I relaxed in the comfort of Serenity's saloon and reviewed our plans for the next day. Joshua returned and we both went ashore finding the well-trodden path over the hill to the famous bridge and luckily got the last table in the Tigh An Truish Inn, they seemed to be operating with reduced staffing levels due to Covid 19. After a delicious celebration dinner we walked back over the hill to where we'd left the inflatable along with all the others and back on Serenity we observed true to its name Pool of the Otters as many of these small mammals frolicked in the water close by.





Day 5: Monday 5th July 2021, High Water Oban 1540 hrs. I was abruptly awakened by the sound of rain that morning and although the anchorage was beautiful lying at anchor in bad weather wasn't much fun.

We decided to depart for the safety of nearby Oban Marina in case the weather got any worse, engine started, anchor weighed and we were off. Less than two hours later we were secure on the pontoon of Oban Marina on the Island of Kerrera, not to be confused with the Transit Marina on Oban towns North Pier (opened in 2017).

Good fortune was on our side as the weather improved with sunshine and blue sky once again. We booked in at the marina office and checked the ferry times, they operate a small passenger ferry the short distance to Oban town back and forth throughout the day though only every two hours, the last ferry at 1830 that day. We went for a short walk before catching the ferry and came across the local Fire Station on the island but no one was in to answer our knock, or they were all asleep after a busy day!





We got off the ferry a little later and walked around the bustling tourist town of Oban restocking with provisions for the boat and met up with our friends Mandy and Mike who were accompanied by Mandy's son Josh and his girlfriend Claire. It was our plan to cruise together from before we left Larne just five days ago when we met up with yacht MOJO and her crew. Joshua and I hitched a lift back to the island aboard Mandy and Mikes Moody 34 but there was little time for socialising that evening as the crew were settling into their new yacht and so it was decided we should muster the following morning to discuss our options. Back in the saloon of Serenity Joshua and I enjoyed a steak dinner, wondering what adventure and surprise the next day would bring...
