Champagne Fouling

So, what was your excuse for the season past? Was it a 'never again or a Not too bad verdict, considering that a typical 2½ litre tin has tipped over the £100 mark! According to Bosun Bobs owner Robert Hastings, "It'll not stop there!" So should the race be on to find a solution to underwater fouling, more especially a Larne Lough [fouling] solution...

"Perhaps if I'd spiced up whatever brand I'd used with a dash of chilli powder, or was it mustard power that one owner suggested...? Personally, I liked the 'champagne option' – oh, if only it had worked – I'd be saving a fortune every season.
